- 1. Page 31 notes, "the ministry provided diversity and inclusion analysis on programs, policies and legislation, such as the *Police Act* review, codes of conduct and standards for professional associations, and the relaunching of the Alberta economy." Will the ministry please table the analysis template used, which programs, policies and legislation were reviewed? Please table a copy of the review of the *Police Act*. Also, please list all professional associations that were reviewed and any consultation or communication with the Premier's Council on the Status of Persons with Disabilities.
- In 2020-2021, CMSW provided diversity and inclusion analysis on the Police Act review as well as to various professional regulatory organizations' updated standards of practice, codes of conduct and ethics, and social media policies. The professional regulatory organizations included:
 - Alberta Dental Association and College,
 - Alberta College of Paramedics,
 - College of Alberta Denturists,
 - College of Physiotherapists of Alberta,
 - Registered Psychiatric Nurses of Alberta, and
 - Alberta College of Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists.
- Staff providing these analyses possess expertise in the areas of gender and diversity
 analysis, unconscious bias, anti-racist frameworks, etc. There is no set template in terms of
 content; generally, a table format is used to support a clause-by-clause or section-by-section
 analysis of the document in question.
- Analysis related to the Police Act review are part of a cabinet decision and therefore, detailed information cannot be shared. Further inquiries should be directed to the Ministry of Justice and Solicitor General.
- 2. The ministry launched four new grant programs to support the non-profit sector. The charitable donation-matching program launched in April matched donations up to \$2 million to eight designated charities. Which eight were selected? How much did each charity receive? What criteria were used to select them, and what were the anticipated outcomes?

- The Charitable Giving Matching Donation Program encouraged Albertans to donate to eight designated Alberta-based registered charities and non-profits that had existing COVID-19 charitable campaigns.
- In total \$4,943,157.45 was raised by these organizations. The province matched each organization's funds at 0.40389 cents on the dollar to expend the \$2 million.
- Contributions helped charities continue to support vulnerable Albertans including seniors, children and the homeless, during the pandemic and in response to public health actions.
- 3. The stabilize program provided one-time grant funding to live-experience organizations, and the report notes that more than 100 live-experience organizations received \$19.3 million. Please table the list of the hundred. What criteria were used to assign the funds? What were the anticipated outcomes for the grant recipients?
- The outcomes of the Stabilize Program are to:
 - Ensure Alberta's long-standing professional and elite amateur sport teams, as well as our non-profit arts and cultural organizations, are sustainable and able to reopen;
 - Enable non-profit organizations to maintain public-use, live experience venues that will provide Albertans with art and cultural experiences now and in the future;
 - Protect Alberta's sport and cultural identity, including our advantage in attracting businesses, skilled workers, and their families; and
 - Foster tourism, restore community vibrancy, and protect Albertan's mental health by reigniting dynamic live experiences.
- Organizations applying for funding within the Stabilize Program must demonstrate that their organization's principle mandate, outcomes, and activities align with one of the following priority areas:
 - Sport, Alberta based elite amateur and professional sports teams or leagues.
 - Rodeo, competitive equestrian sport generally comprised of hosting the following Alberta based events: tie-down roping, team roping, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding and barrel racing.
 - Own and/or operate dedicated presenting and performing arts facilities, including theatre, musical theatre and opera, dance, music, and other performing arts.
- The Stabilize Program provided one-time funding to organizations who demonstrated financial need and exhaustion of other financial supports and resources. To demonstrate financial need, organizations must:
 - Submit monthly cash-flow statements for their current and next fiscal years;
 - Explain and provide supporting data demonstrating how the organization has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic;
 - Demonstrate they have exhausted other financial resources, including reserves (if applicable) and applied for all applicable funding; and to clearly explanation what the requested funds will cover.

- 4. Page 27 notes that the Francophone Secretariat worked "with relevant ministries to increase the dissemination of information in French beyond the requirements of [the] French Policy." Please list all ministries that were partnered with. What were those outcomes?
- In 2020-2021, as part of the Government of Alberta's COVID-19 pandemic response, the Francophone Secretariat worked with Communications and Public Engagement, Health and Education to increase the dissemination of information in French.
- At the beginning of the pandemic, Francophone Secretariat and Communications and Public Engagement staff met on a daily basis to coordinate the timely translation and dissemination of critical public health information in French and in multiple languages.
- The purpose of this work was to ensure that French-speaking Albertans, particularly schoolaged children and their parents, had access to critical public health information in a timely manner.
- The information was shared with Francophonie stakeholders on a daily basis (as required) through web content, direct mail-outs and the Francophone Secretariat's social media account.
- 5. Page 33, objective 3.6 reads: "Support the cross-government implementation of key actions responding to the Calls for Justice in the Final Report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls." How many monthly meetings were held? Please table any minutes. Were there any recommendations for the government of Alberta? Any timelines or measures?
- The Alberta Joint Working Group submitted their recommendations report in January 2022.
 Meeting details materials related to the Alberta Joint Working Group are managed by the
 Ministry of Indigenous Relations and are part of a cabinet decision and therefore, detailed
 information cannot be shared. Further inquiries should be directed to the Ministry of
 Indigenous Relations.
- 6. The annual report states that more than 1,400 grants were approved, and on page 59 it is explained that the ministry's largest expenditure category of \$165 million, or 69 per cent of the total operating expense, was mainly attributed to extra spending to support the government's COVID-19 response. Can you provide us with an overview of how many grants were received, and how did these grants benefits Albertans?
- In 2020-21, Culture, Multiculturalism and Status of Women's Community Grants area alone (not all Ministry granting areas) received approximately 2,700 grant applications. As stated in the Annual Report, we approved 1,400 grants over the course of the year.
- The 1400 grants were provided through CMSW's regular community grant programs and one-time grant programs to support the COVID-19 response and were based on sector needs.

- Some examples of the one-time program funding include:
 - The Charitable Donation Matching Program encouraged Albertans to donate to the pandemic response efforts by providing \$2 million in matching funds for donations to eight designated Alberta-based charities that had existing COVID-19 charitable campaigns. Albertans donated almost \$5 million during the matching campaign period, including many that went above the maximum government matching amount.
 - \$8 million was allocated to the Community Initiatives Project (CIP) Operating Grant program to help struggling front-line non-profits maintain their core functions due to health restrictions (a portion of the funding was reallocated from CIP Project Based grants) resulting in 35 more groups receiving funding for a total of 127 organizations.
 - The Overnight Camps (for Children and Youth) Facility Overhead Funding Program was launched to support non-profit organizations that own and operate overnight children and youth camps providing \$2.7 million to 76 organizations.
 - \$2.1 million in funding was provided to faith-based and cultural organizations through the Faith-based and Cultural Facility Relaunch Program to ensure that gatherings could continue during the pandemic.
 - 587 applications were approved through this program.
 - The Stabilize Program was created to support live-experience organizations and arts venues through two funding streams:
 - Stabilize Program Phase 1 provided one-time grant funding up to a maximum of \$1 million (or up to 25 per cent of eligible facility overhead and/or operating expenses) for one year.
 - We received 164 applications requesting total funding of \$57.52 million.
 - We granted over \$16 million in funding to 104 applicants.
 - The **Stabilize Donation Matching Program** was a sub-stream of the Stabilize Program established to match dollar-for-dollar private donations to eligible non-profits from \$250,000 to a maximum of \$1 million.
 - Four organizations received funding through this stream with grants totalling \$3 million.
- 7. Key objective 1.1 on page 15 of the annual report. This ministry and the government are committed to support Alberta's cultural industries and have set a goal to grow the industry by \$1.5 billion over the next decade. How effective has the ministry been in advancing the goal of growing Alberta's creative and cultural industries?
- The **Alberta Media Fund**, is a suite of grants through which Alberta's government supports the growth of the film and television, book publishing, magazine publishing and sound recording industries in Alberta.

- Albertan created projects, supported through the Alberta Made Production Grant, ensure important Albertan stories are being told to local and international audiences. Each \$1 million in investment to the Film and Television Tax Credit or the Alberta Made Production Grant results in the approximately 59 jobs for Albertans.
- Through the suite of grants provided through the Alberta Media Fund and through Alberta Film Commission, the ministry offers services to support growth of the film and television sector.
- The ministry also supports the growth of Alberta's creative and cultural industries through consultation, advocacy, industry development, and collaborative efforts to expand market access for the creative sectors.
- The ministry uses data from the Provincial and Territorial Cultural Indicators to monitor and assess the growth of these sectors. This information provides an overall look at the strength of these sectors.
- In 2018-19, the creative and cultural industries contributed \$5.2 billion in GDP to Alberta's economy and sustained 51,077 jobs in the province (Statistics Canada Provincial and Territorial Cultural Indicators).
 - Statistics Canada's has revised the date they release data; the next release in June 2022 will provide data on 2020.
 - To account for this delay, supplemental data, such as industry reports and research from union/professional associations, and grant related information will be used to assess progress towards meeting this goal.

- Between 2010 and 2017, Alberta's live music sector grew 25.4 per cent, music support and broadcasting grew 25.2 per cent and sound recording grew 19.8 per cent (West Anthem Music Ecosystem Study).
- Alberta magazine publishers produce nearly 150 titles and deliver 18 million copies of Alberta magazines to readers each year.
- Across Canada the book publishing industry saw a decrease in book sales due to the closure of non-essential businesses limiting sales of books. This resulted in a decline in revenue from 2018-2020 of 4.4 per cent. As publishers pivoted to sell their books through online channels, internet sales of print books rose 23 per cent and e-book sales increased 31 per cent.
- In 2020-21, \$988,215 in post-production funding represented more than \$5.5 million spent on Albertan labour.
- Two Alberta post-production sound studios have credited this program with allowing them
 the agility to expand their workforce and create ATMOS Dolby Sound facilities in their
 studios, enabling them to compete for work from major streaming networks like Disney+,
 Netflix and Apple TV.
 - Apple TV's Fraggle Rock filmed in the Calgary Film Centre at the height of the pandemic and is a great example of this industry's ability to pivot quickly to meet ongoing safety requirements and continue to be a key economic driver as pandemic restrictions were in place.
- 2020-21 also saw the release of some other notable projects filmed in Alberta, such as:
 - Ghostbusters: Afterlife, which hosted a special Canadian Premiere in the Alberta community of Fort MacLeod, with proceeds from tickets going to restore the Empress Theatre.
 - Focus Feature's Let Him Go, starring Kevin Costner and Land, starring Robin Wright (also her directorial debut).
- Albertan creators supported through the Alberta Made Production Grant are also getting recognition on the national and international stage, showcasing the talent that Alberta has to offer. For example:
 - True West: The John Scott Story a feature documentary film about Western culture, cowboys, stunt people, and movie making. True West is an Alberta made film that showcases our award winning back drops and top of the industry talent in feature films and television. John Scott is Alberta's grass roots cowboy and Academy award winning movie man, bridging the gap between Alberta and Hollywood. This film premiered at and won the People's Choice Award at the 2020 Calgary International Film Festival and also won an award for Best Female Producer at the Toronto International Film Festival.
 - Connecting Flights A feature where following the death of his mother a man decides to search for his father who was a visiting Canadian serviceman during World War II. The production has been an official festival selection at multiple festivals including the Montreal Independent Film Festival and the Seattle Film Festival. It was also a festival winner for Best Feature at both the Cannes Indie Cinema Festival as well as the Great Lakes International Film Festival.

- 8. Page 9 of the annual report "speaks to the government's commitment to reduce red tape to make life easier for Albertans, non-profits and businesses. On page 14, it shows that the ministry achieved a 14.2 per cent net reduction of red tape, which exceeded the government's commitment to achieve 12 per cent reduction during the period in discussion. What did the ministry do to reduce regulatory burden and unnecessary processes for non-profit organizations? What were the main red tape reduction initiatives your department worked on? What was the impact of this work, and how have Albertans benefited from such work?
- The *Freedom to Care Act* was introduced in the legislature in March 2021. This act allows charities, non-profit groups, and volunteers to apply for common-sense exemptions from regulations designed primarily for commercial application, where those regulations have the unintended consequence of preventing a social good from being performed.
- With the introduction and implementation of the *Freedom to Care Act*, we are supporting non-profit organizations by:
 - making it easier for non-profits to identify and access existing exemptions to regulations,
 - creating a process for non-profits to apply for one-time, short-term exemptions from regulations – if an exemption does not already exist, and
 - introducing new liability protections for volunteers who are acting in good faith within their scope of duties.
- The main red tape initiatives the ministry has been focused on are:
 - Developing and implementing a new regulatory approach for the Historical Resources Act approvals that restructures the relationship between the ministry, forestry companies, and consulting archaeologists. This will allow for earlier project submissions; provides companies with an option to use low-impact harvesting methods to avoid adverse effects to landforms highly likely to contain historic resources; and will explore the use of archaeological site predictive models to streamline submissions.
 - Moving to an online grant application for Albertans wanting to access the ministry's grants including non-profit organizations.
 - The online grant application will provide a consistent set of expectations for each step of the grant cycle that the ministry can use to assess performance and support continuous improvement. This will include mapping ministry grant outcomes against grant program objectives and outcomes to help identify gaps or duplication.
 - As application forms represent approximately 58 per cent of the Ministry's current count, streamlining and standardizing forms through the online application process will likely yield substantial reductions in the Ministry's red tape reduction initiatives.
- The impact this work will have on Albertans is considerable as it will save time, resources and effort, which is invaluable to the non-profit organizations we serve.
